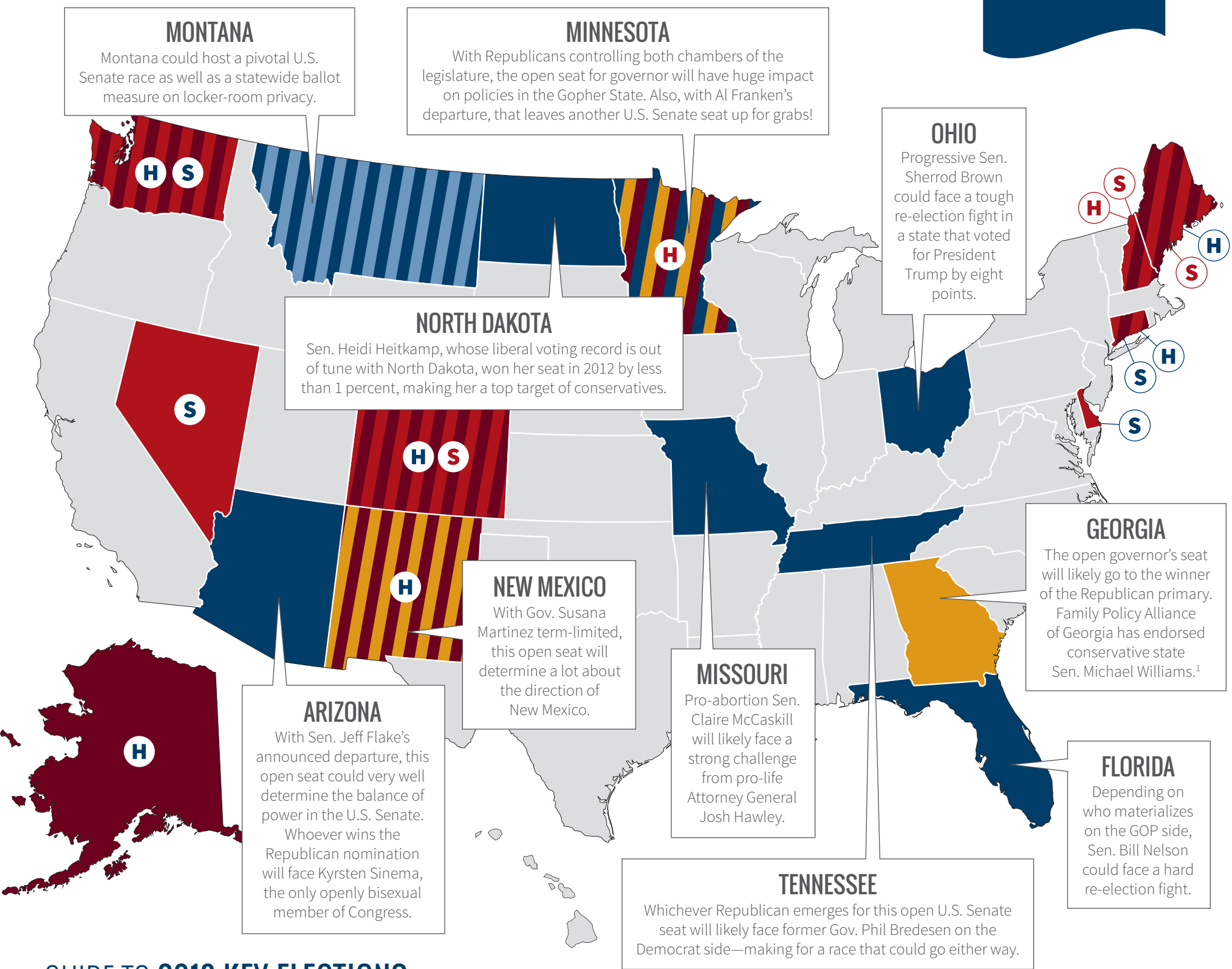


WHICH DIRECTION WILL AMERICA GO?

2018 ELECTIONS



MONTANA

Montana could host a pivotal U.S. Senate race as well as a statewide ballot measure on locker-room privacy.

MINNESOTA

With Republicans controlling both chambers of the legislature, the open seat for governor will have huge impact on policies in the Gopher State. Also, with Al Franken's departure, that leaves another U.S. Senate seat up for grabs!

OHIO

Progressive Sen. Sherrod Brown could face a tough re-election fight in a state that voted for President Trump by eight points.

NORTH DAKOTA

Sen. Heidi Heitkamp, whose liberal voting record is out of tune with North Dakota, won her seat in 2012 by less than 1 percent, making her a top target of conservatives.

NEW MEXICO

With Gov. Susana Martinez term-limited, this open seat will determine a lot about the direction of New Mexico.

MISSOURI

Pro-abortion Sen. Claire McCaskill will likely face a strong challenge from pro-life Attorney General Josh Hawley.

TENNESSEE

Whichever Republican emerges for this open U.S. Senate seat will likely face former Gov. Phil Bredesen on the Democrat side—making for a race that could go either way.

ARIZONA

With Sen. Jeff Flake's announced departure, this open seat could very well determine the balance of power in the U.S. Senate. Whoever wins the Republican nomination will face Kyrsten Sinema, the only openly bisexual member of Congress.

GEORGIA

The open governor's seat will likely go to the winner of the Republican primary. Family Policy Alliance of Georgia has endorsed conservative state Sen. Michael Williams.¹

FLORIDA

Depending on who materializes on the GOP side, Sen. Bill Nelson could face a hard re-election fight.
